Daniel N. Arshack, an attorney duly admitted to practice law in the State of New York, affirms under penalty of perjury that:

I am the attorney of record for the defendant. As such I am fully familiar with the facts of this case and make this affirmation in support of this motion to dismiss this case in the interests of justice based on the facts of this case.

THE FACTS

Suzanne Lafont, (hereinafter, Suzanne) is a petite 59 year old woman. She is 5' 8" tall and weighs 125 pounds (See, page 2 of the Alert Sheet/ Finger Print Response attached hereto as Exhibit A.). She is a Anthropology professor at CUNY (See, Suzanne's CV attached hereto as Exhibit B). Suzanne is married to Karl Anders Peltoma, (hereinafter, Karl), a physicist, who is also a small man, 5'9" tall and approximately 143 pounds.(See, Karl's medical record attached hereto as Exhibit C). Karl suffers from Marfan Syndrome which is a congenital genetic syndrome which often

results in heart malfunctions. The two of them live with their dog at 30 West 83rd Street

in Manhattan.

On April 5, 2013, Karl had open-heart surgery to address a thoracic aortic

aneurysm and repair his heart valve. Karl and Suzanne had learned eight years ago that

Karl has a genetic condition related to Marfans. His father died of an aortic aneurysm in

1994 (dissection). His sister died of an aortic aneurysm in 2004 (two weeks after giving

birth to her second child). On March 13th, this year, they learned that Karl's aneurysm

had grown to the point of him needing surgery and his surgery was scheduled thereafter

as soon as possible. On April 10, 2013: Karl was released from the hospital. He was

prescribed several medications including Vicodin.

On the evening of April 11, 2013 after walking their dog together, Karl had a

glass and a half of wine and thereafter began feeling very anxious. Because she was

concerned that her husband was experiencing a complication of the surgery, Suzanne

immediately called 911. On the 911 tape, Suzanne can be heard expressing her worry

that her husband was having a post surgical reaction. She called twice, the first time, she

called briefly but hung up quickly when it seemed that her husband needed her help and

then she immediately called right back:

911 Message 1

911 Operator: 911 What is the emergency?

Caller: No, no, no, no, no

911 Operator: Hello? Hello?

(Call ended)

911 Message 2

3

911 Operator: 911 What is the emergency?

Caller: Yes please my husband is freaking out.

911 Operator: Sure what's the address?

Caller: 30 West 83rd Street Apartment number 2. And he just got discharged to the hospital yesterday for heart surgery. He's on a lot of medication. And he's freaking out.

911 Operator: He's freaking out. Do you need an ambulance?

Caller: We need an ambulance.

911 Operator: He has a medical... uhh he has a psych history?

Caller: No he doesn't have a psych history. No he's just got a medical history. He had an open heart surgery on Friday.

911 Operator: Okay...okay...okay... what apartment.... What apartment are you in? What apartment? What apartment?

Caller: Hello?

911 Operator: Apartment 2

Caller: Stop. This is the

(Call ended)

In short order, police, EMS and the fire department arrived. Suzanne met them at the front door (they live on the first floor) and explained that her husband had just had open heart surgery and seemed to be having a post surgical reaction. As she spoke to Police Officer Giambra (approximately 6' 2" and 220 pounds) at the door, her dog ran out of the apartment and the police stayed at the open door to the apartment while Suzanne ran down the hall to retrieve him. One of the responders grabbed the dog as he reached the sidewalk. Suzanne was gone only a few seconds to retrieve our dog but when she got back into the hallway, the police officer had Karl pressed against the

hallway wall, directly on his surgical wound on his chest and others were cuffing him. The police officer was pressing Karl's chest against the wall while two other officers were cuffing his hands behind his back. Suzanne repeated that Karl had just had openheart surgery, and told them that they should not be pressing him against the wall because his incision was still very fragile.² Suzanne tried to protect her husband from the officer by touching his shoulder while continuing to explain that her husband could not be treated be so roughly due to his fragile medical condition. The officer immediately turned to Suzanne and said, "You are under arrest." Suzanne could not believe and still does not believe that she had done anything to warrant arrest. Nothing that she did interfered in any way with the officer's engagement with Karl. They smashed him against the wall and then threw him onto his chest on the floor thereby opening up a bloody gash in his chin and dislocating his thumb. The police cuffed Suzanne and led her into her apartment so that she could get her ID.

While she was in their apartment, cuffed and trying to assist the officer with finding her ID, she heard yelling in the hallway. The police officer was screaming at Karl and repeatedly used the F-word. Moments later, having taken her ID from her hand bag, when the other officer opened the door to her apartment, she saw Karl lying face down in the hallway in a pool of blood. When she cried that that they had broken open the incision in his chest, the police officer remarked that it was not his chest that was bleeding. He said that the blood was coming from Karl's chin which had been cut open when they slammed Karl onto the floor. Karl was still cuffed when they flipped him over and dragged him out of the building.

Suzanne was taken to the 20th Precinct where, after a couple of hours, she started to develop a migraine (a condition which she has experienced intermittently in the past) and asked to be taken to the hospital – because she was told that was the only way she could obtain any medication. When she was removed from the cell at the precinct, she was again handcuffed and then shackled.

The shackles were kept on her the entire time she was at St Luke's Hospital (which was the same hospital to which Karl had been taken). Once she was taken to a bed, the cuffs were removed from behind her back and she was cuffed to the bed. She was treated at St Luke's for migraine (100 mg of Imitrex, 2 fiornal). (See, Suzanne's medical record attached as Exhibit D). One of the doctors came by and asked Suzanne if she was Karl Peltoma's wife. Of course she said that she was but she was not permitted to see him. She was asked some questions about his medical condition and after a few hours she was returned to the 20th Precinct where she was detained for the next 17 hours.

Late in the afternoon of April 12th, she was removed from the cell, cuffed, and driven to Central Booking. She arrived there at about 4:30 p.m. and was released ROR from the arraignment court at about 6:00pm.

Suzanne was charged with Obstructing Governmental Administration (PL §195.05) and Harassment in the Second Degree (PL §240.26). PL §195.05 requires a showing that a defendant "intentionally obstructs impairs or perverts the administration of law or other governmental function or prevents or attempts to prevent a public servant from performing an official function by means of intimidation, physical force or interference [...]. PL §240.26 requires a showing that "with the intent to harass annoy or

alarm another person she shoves, strikes, kicks or otherwise subjects such other person to physical contact, or attempts or threatens to do the same [...]." There is no reason to believe that Suzanne ever had the intent to obstruct, impair or prevent a public servant from carrying out his function. Further, it is clear that Suzanne never had the intent to harass, annoy or alarm. Suzanne was at all times trying to assure that her husband receive the medical care that he needed and that is why she called for help. When she saw her husband, two days after open heart surgery being man handled by the police she tried to protect him...nothing more. That she was herself arrested and processed through the system is nothing short of outrageous. There is no suggestion in the criminal complaint that the police officer who responded to her call for help were limited, in any way, by Suzanne, from carrying out what they believed to be their official function. They did precisely what they set out to do.

DISMISSAL IN THE INTEREST OF JUSTICE

As the Court is aware, the procedure for determining whether a non-felony case should be dismissed in the interest of justice is contained within the CPL §170.40 as follows:

The court must, to the extent applicable, examine and consider, individually and collectively, the following:

- (a) the seriousness and circumstances of the offense;
- (b) the extent of harm caused by the offense;
- (c) the evidence of guilt, whether admissible or inadmissible at trial;
- (d) the history, character and condition of the defendant;
- (e) any exceptionally serious misconduct of law enforcement personnel in the investigation, arrest and prosecution of the defendant:

- (f) the purpose and effect of imposing upon the defendant a sentence authorized for the offense;
- (g) the impact of a dismissal upon the confidence of the public in the criminal justice system;
- (h) the impact of a dismissal on the safety or welfare of the community;
- (i) where the court deems it appropriate, the attitude of the complainant or victim with respect to the motion;
- (j) any other relevant fact indicating that a judgment of conviction would serve no useful purpose.

(A) THE SERIOUSNESS AND CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE OFFENSE

Except for the negative effect Suzanne's arrest has had on her confidence in her local police to assist her when needed, this is not a serious case. There was no injury to a complainant, no loss. Most importantly there was no crime since there was no intent, pursuant to PL §195.05, to obstructs impair or pervert the administration of law or other governmental function or to prevent or attempt to prevent a public servant from performing an official function by means of intimidation, physical force or interference [...]. Nor was there any intent, pursuant to PL §240.26, to harass annoy or alarm another person by shoving, striking, kicking or otherwise subjecting such other person to physical contact, or attempting or threatening to do the same [...]." It could not be clearer that Suzanne only wanted to protect her husband and get him the help he needed. Who amongst us would not have been horrified to see our spouse, as fragile as Karl was, having his chest being slammed against the wall and then smashed onto the floor resulting in a bloody facial laceration and dislocated thumb. This case was nothing but

over reaction and the exercise of a little professional discretion would have avoided the entire incident.

It is also important to note that dismissal in the interest of justice has been granted to defendants who have had greater participation in crimes of a much higher magnitude than that alleged here. See, e.g., People v. Plummer, 80 Misc.2d 820, 364 N.Y.S.2d 697 (Sup. Ct. Erie Co. 1975) (indictment charging defendant, an inmate in the Attica Correction Facility, with assault in the second degree was dismissed in the interest of justice even though the defendant hit a correction officer with a 2 x 4 which caused a laceration of the officer's head requiring 12 sutures); People v. Vecchio, 139 Misc.2d 165, 526 N.Y.S.2d 698 (Sup. Ct. Queens Co. 1987) (two top counts of indictment, A-II and B felony controlled substance offenses, dismissed in the interest of justice).

(B) THE EXTENT OF HARM CAUSED BY THE OFFENSE

It is respectfully submitted that there was no offense and, in any event, there was no harm.

(C) THE EVIDENCE OF GUILT, WHETHER ADMISSIBLE OR INADMISSIBLE AT TRIAL

There is no evidence of guilt in this case. There is nothing but doubt that guilt can be proven. Suzanne behaved reasonably and as expected under the stressful circumstances she experienced. Her behavior was justified under the circumstances and should not be criminalized.

(D) THE HISTORY, CHARACTER AND CONDITION OF THE DEFENDANT

Suzanne has never before been charge with a crime. She is a professor of Anthropology at CUNY. Suzanne's character only supports the relief sought by this motion.

The First Department has recognized that:

there may be unusual circumstances under which the sentence mandated by law upon conviction of a count of an indictment would be so disproportionate to a defendant's actual culpability as to constitute a "compelling factor," when considered together with all the relevant considerations described in CPL 210.40, that would justify dismissal of the count to avoid an injustice.

People v. Cruz, 114 A.D.2d 769, ____, 495 N.Y.S.2d 162, 163 (1st Dept. 1985). See also People v. Sales. 169 A.D.2d 411, 563 N.Y.S.2d 825 (1st Dept. 1991) (affirming trial court's dismissal in interest of justice an indictment charging defendant with robbery in the second degree as authorized sentence would serve no useful purpose and defendant's prospects for future schooling and employment were good);

(E) ANY EXCEPTIONALLY SERIOUS MISCONDUCT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONNEL IN THE INVESTIGATION, ARREST AND PROSECUTION OF THE DEFENDANT

By this motion we are not suggesting that there was any illegal conduct by the law enforcement personnel in this matter. It is certainly clear, however, that some professional exercise of calm and collected discretion at the scene of this charged event could have avoided this case altogether. Further, it is certainly disappointing that Suzanne had to be subjected to this arrest at the same time as she was seeking help for her husband. In light of the factual circumstances, dismissal in the interests of justice is clearly a reasonable result.

(F) THE PURPOSE AND EFFECT OF IMPOSING UPON THE DEFENDANT A SENTENCE AUTHORIZED FOR THE OFFENSE

Is there any reason to burden Suzanne with a criminal conviction for the events which occurred in her hallway on April 11, 2013? In light of the fact that there are no facts to support a showing of an intent to violate either of the statutes with which she has been charged, the answer can only be a resounding "no."

(G) THE IMPACT OF A DISMISSAL UPON THE CONFIDENCE OF THE PUBLIC IN THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM

The fact is that dismissing this case in the interest of justice will contribute to public confidence in the criminal justice system. There has been no press interest in this case and we don't expect any, so public confidence is not likely to be affected in any event. In the abstract, however, when the criminal justice system recognizes that the facts just don't support the bringing of a charge and dismisses a case, before putting a person though the crucible of trial, the public and the criminal justice system is well served.

(H) THE IMPACT OF A DISMISSAL ON THE SAFETY OR WELFARE OF THE COMMUNITY

The safety and welfare of the community will not be impacted by dismissing this case.

(I) WHERE THE COURT DEEMS IT APPROPRIATE, THE ATTITUDE OF THE COMPLAINANT OR VICTIM WITH RESPECT TO THE MOTION

The complainant in this matter is a professional police officer who arrested

Suzanne when she was seeking help for her very ill husband. The language of the statute

itself uses the word, "attitude." Indeed, it was the complainant's attitude, perhaps his lack of understanding and compassion, which contributed to this circumstance and hopefully he has an understanding of the availability of a better course in his future dealings with the citizens in his community. This could happen to any of us or to our wives, husbands or parents calling for help to 911. It should never happen to anyone. It should never have happened to Suzanne and it should be ended now.

(J) ANY OTHER RELEVANT FACT INDICATING THAT A JUDGMENT OF CONVICTION WOULD SERVE NO USEFUL PURPOSE

Those of us who work in the criminal justice system sometimes become inured to the devastating impact that the mere bringing of charges can have on a person's conception of their place in the community, their conception of safety and the availability of a safety net in the event a tragedy occurs. Suzanne thought she was reaching out correctly for help when her husband started having a bad medical reaction to wine and Vicodin two days after being released for his open heart surgery. She explained the situation to the 911 operator and to the professional law enforcement officers who arrived and then she had to witness her husband being slammed against a wall and then smashed onto the ground. There is no view of the facts consistent with guilt in this matter. For that reason, and because the interests of justice persuade us that it is the right thing to do, this case should be dismissed.
